

See inside back cover for more information. he old Lakewood was a sleepy, little town, a well-known resort for the wealthy and a retreat for presidents and the celebrated of a gilded age. Today's Lakewood is a vibrant, exciting place of natural beauty and urban cosmopolitism. Its lakes, parks and the quaint touches of its Victorian past are ongoing reminders of the town's resort heritage. Home to New Jersey's second Catholic university and the world's largest Rabbinical college, Lakewood today brims with the youthful vitality that is part of an academic community drawn from many corners of the world.

Business opportunities abound in Lakewood not only



because of its location, but also because of its on-going growth and phenomenal development. Lakewood is situated near several major roads, including the Garden State Parkway. It is within an hour and a half of New York City,

Philadelphia, Atlantic City and the state capitol of Trenton, and only a few miles from beaches, boardwalks, and malls.

Its central location in the state and access to major roads have continued to spur on major building projects, touching all aspects of life in Lakewood. In April 2001, a \$22 million baseball stadium built with Urban Enterprise Zone (UEZ) funds opened with the first game of the Lakewood BlueClaws, a "Single A" Minor League affiliate of the Philadelphia Phillies. By April 2003, the Lakewood BlueClaws drew one MILLION people to its stadium, FirstEnergy Park – recording New Jersey's and the South Atlantic League's quickest baseball team to reach that mark in the shortest period of time.

The newly renovated historic Strand Theater, designed by world-renowned theater architect Thomas Lamb and opened in 1922, is listed on the New Jersey and National Register of Historic Places. Offering year-round entertainment in plush, air-conditioned surroundings, the Strand continues to be a perfect venue to showcase its season of comedians, musicals, dinner theater, stars from television and movies, and legendary musical entertainers. A new gallery for dinner-theater-in-the-round, smaller shows, and receptions includes a catering facility, dance floor, and handicap accessible restrooms.

Besides business opportunities, Lakewood abounds in leisure and cultural activities. There are 15 free municipal playgrounds, a township park, lakes, three county parks, two public golf courses, a private golf course, historical sites to visit, and many fun-filled summer events. And the parking is free!

Parks are popular for relaxation, picnics, and recreation of all kinds...from hiking, biking, and fitness trails to volleyball, basketball, tennis courts, and open playing fields for almost



every sport. Ocean County Park, once the 323-acre estate of John D. Rockefeller, has three lakes, one for swimming and one for fishing. Many recreational activities surround beautiful Lake Carasaljo, including an exercise trail; a 4.5 mile path for walking, running, and biking; fishing and picnicking. Rowboats and paddle boats can be rented Memorial Day through Labor Day and the All Wars Memorial Amphitheater is the site of many community events and concerts, scheduled throughout the summer. Most sites have restrooms and are handicap accessible.



The BlueClaws, the South Atlantic League affiliate of the Philadelphia Phillies, play their April to September season at FirstEnergy Park, Lakewood's "fan-friendly" 6,588 seat stadium located at the intersection of New Hampshire (CR623) and Cedar Bridge Avenues (CR528).




Did You Know?...

In the early 1900's, renowned theater architect Thomas W. Lamb was commissioned by the Ferber Amusement Company to design a theater in Lakewood, a quality resort location, as a "try out" town before moving a show to New York.

Opened in 1922 in an era before electronic amplification, the Strand features excellent acoustics, exemplary sightlines. The Strand Theater is listed on the New Jersey and National Registers of Historic Places.


Lakewood Township Airport



The public is invited to visit the Lakewood Airport, situated near FirstEnergy Park, home to the Lakewood BlueClaws. The airport is the base for more than 60 private aircraft, two flying clubs and the Pinelands Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol. With the new 3,450 ft. long runway, it can accommodate most single- and twinengine aircraft. The airport has facilities for fuel and repair services, a flight school, aircraft rental and sales, charter service, and tiedowns. The airport is a "work in progress" with plans for hangars; a new access road: and terminal

(Caroline, Sally and Josephine) of Joseph W. Brick,

4.5 mile hiking trail, complete with exercise stations.

HISTORIC Lakewood New Jersey



"Peaceful, pleasure-loving Lakewood." This quote appeared in Rudvard Kipling's 1891 American Notes. At the turn of the century, Lakewood was a haven for the rich and famous. It was a premier resort visited by presidents, financiers, literary figures, entertainers and famous sports personalities. U.S. Presidents Grant, Cleveland, Wilson, Taft, and T. Roosevelt all visited or stayed at one of Lakewood's luxurious hotels. Oil baron John D. Rockefeller and financier George J. Gould maintained estates here. Literary giants Rudyard Kipling, Mark Twain, William Cullen Bryant, Oliver Wendell Holmes, Joseph Pulitzer, and Sholom Aleichem visited and met at local residences and hotels. Boxers "Gentleman Jim" Corbett, Max Baer, Buddy Baer, Max Schmeling, and Joe Louis trained for bouts in Lakewood. The New York Giants baseball team chose Lakewood for spring training during 1895 and 1943, 1944, and 1945. Visiting entertainers included Italian tenor Enrico Caruso; famous bandmaster John Philip Sousa; actress Helen Haves; comedians Milton Berle, Burns & Allen, and Alan King; and song stylist Pearl Bailey.

Though far from complete, the list of luminaries who visited the small town of Lakewood was indeed extraordinary. Not many local towns can boast of having such an array of famous and influential people as part of its history.
